DETAILS

You will do three writing assignments of 4 pages each during the course (assigned topics), and a long writing assignment of 12 pages (topic of your choice, approved by me beforehand). These will all be exposition. "Exposition" means that you are to put forth (ex – posit) Foucault's ideas, in your own words, that is, without paraphrase, as clearly and carefully as possible. You can redo the assignments once and get the second grade, but you're not guaranteed the second grade will be better than the first.
